



Seeds on Country



We teach students how to make handmade seed bombs using native plant seeds. Our First Nations representative will explain why native plants are essential for a healthy local environment and how First Nations peoples traditionally used native plants. This session is for schools that want a hands-on, creative way to build student understanding of biodiversity and First Nations culture and to learn simple habitat-restoration skills.

Prep – Grade 6.

Number of students per session

Up to 30 students per session.

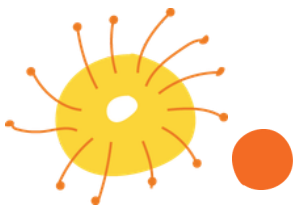
Duration

Timing

All year round. Seed bombs best planted in late Winter.





What's involved

A Traditional Owner representative will help students to discover the secret powers of native seeds and plants. Students will learn why native plants matter for local wildlife and how they can help us to care for Country, as well as their traditional uses as bush tucker, bush remedies and making Aboriginal tools.

Students will make their own seed bombs using native seeds local to your area, with help from our team. The session includes all materials and native seeds, and planting instructions for teachers so that they can plant the seed bombs when they dry (2-3 days after session).
